These signs include an increase in young adult engagement; our growing and vibrant Latino community; the spiritual awakening brought about by our Year of the Eucharist; and an increased interest in vocations, which remains a critical need for our future.

## **Financial Report 2021**

#### Dear Friends of the Diocese of Springfield,

It is my privilege, as the Chief Financial Officer of the Diocese of Springfield, to present to you the 2020-2021 audited financial reports for the diocese. It is a great honor for me to have been selected by Most Reverend William Byrne to be the Chief Financial Officer for the Diocese of Springfield in May 2021. My predecessor, William LaBroad, served this diocese with distinction for over a quarter of a century and navigated the Diocese of Springfield through many challenges. I am grateful for all the work he has done.

Bishop Byrne has continually stressed the importance of transparency and accountability. As such, under Bishop Byrne's direction, this is the first time the Diocese of Springfield has made its financial statements available for public inspection. Sharing our financial results with you provides transparency about the stewardship and management of the assets so generously given to the diocese over the years.

# Here are some of the highlights of the 2020-2021 financial report:

- The Diocese's fiscal year (FY) runs from July 1st to June 30th.
- Total assets increased in FY21 to \$231,427,767 from \$190,084,119 in FY20 largely due to the increase in value of investments. Investments went from \$130,513,313 in FY20 to \$179,526,648 in FY21.
- Total liabilities increased from \$95,977,817 in FY20 to \$121,165,195 in FY21, predominately due to an increase in custodial funds as their values increase similarly to investment increases. Custodial funds are funds collected at the diocese's central administrative office and held on behalf of other organizations, like parishes. Since these funds do not belong to the diocese's central administrative office, they are recorded as a liability.
- Compared to FY20, operating results were much improved, having a loss of \$336,988 compared to the loss of \$3.8 million in FY20. The major difference between the two years was a \$1.8 million change in value of a beneficial interest in trusts in FY21 compared to \$94,831 in FY20. Additionally, operating results without donor restrictions improved in FY21 by \$1,449,720.
- Thanks to the kindness and generosity of so many people across the diocesan family, the Annual Catholic Appeal saw an approximately \$300 thousand increase over FY20. It was great to see so much generosity in such difficult times!

- Non-operating results improved in FY21 by about \$25 million. Two items created this significant difference. The first and most significant being a net realized and unrealized gain of \$18.5 million in FY21 compared to a \$57,103 loss in FY20. The second item was the result of a transfer of insurance proceeds, resulting in a reduction of net assets in FY20 of approximately \$5.2 million.
- As in years past, the financial statements of the Diocese of Springfield have been independently audited by Wolf & Company, P.C., a Certified Public Accounting firm. The results reflected in the enclosed summary are just from the Central Administrative Offices of the Diocese of Springfield. Wolf & Company, P.C. also audits the Diocese's Foundation, Catholic Charities, and Cemeteries financial statements and performs a review of the Diocese's Communications financial statements, which are not reflected in this statement.

In all of the audits conducted, the Diocese of Springfield received an unmodified opinion. I invite you to review the full audit reports for each of the five Diocese of Springfield entities. You can find these reports at: www.diospringfield.org

I sincerely appreciate the Diocesan Finance Council for the assistance, support, and guidance they have provided to the diocese, myself, and most importantly to Bishop Byrne. I also genuinely appreciate the hard work the entire staff puts in on a daily basis to ensure we are being diligent and good stewards of the good and generous people in our Diocese. Finally, I am eternally grateful to Bishop Byrne for asking me to serve the Diocese of Springfield in this important ministry and for all the guidance and support he has given to me.

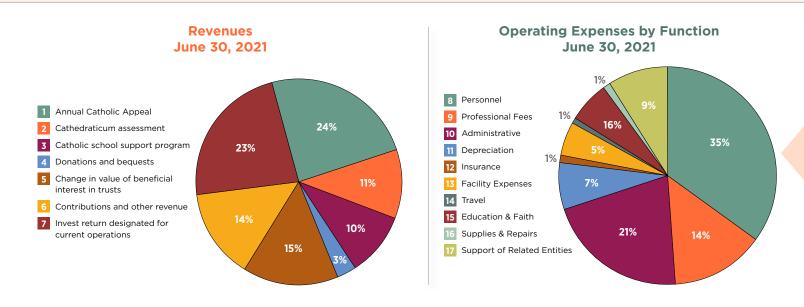
